MANY CANDIDATES TO CONTEST VICTORIA AND VANCOUVER DEFERRED ELECTIONS

Twenty-seven candidates were nominated in Victoria for the deferred provincial election on November 27, voting on candidates for the four seats in the Capital and two in Vancouver Cen. having been delayed following the death between nomination and general election day of the late Mr. William J. Bowser, K.C., leader of the Non-Partisan Group, who was a candidate in both Ridings. Thirteen candidates were nominated in Vancouver Centre.

DR. TOLMIE TO RESIGN NEXT WEDNESDAY

Twelve hours after the results of the Provincial Elections on the 2nd. had been announced Prime Minister the Honourable Dr. Simon Fraser Tolmie notified all the members of his cabinet that he desired their resignations by November 15th. to place in the hands of the Lieutenant-Governor on that date. Premier Dr. Tolmie is not anxious to hang on to office a minute longer than necessary to put the House in order. Premier-elect Mr. T. D. Pattullo will undoubtedly be called upon to form a government. This the Honourable Mr. Pattullo is prepared to do. He has not of course announced any members of his cabinet but he has plenty of good men to select from.

By the action of Dr. Tolmie the new government should be in office by the end of this month and by the first of the year have things in shape for an early session of the Legislature.

The Honourable Mr. Pattullo is no doubt anxious for an early session so that he can get his policies approved and started to work at the earliest possible moment in order to relieve the depression that has held British Columbia for the past few years. That is as far as he possibly can. Any effort he makes toward relieving the situation during the coming winter will, no doubt, have the united support of all the members.

CENT A MILE RATE ANNOUNCED

Mr. Harold McEwen, Canadian National Railways divisional freight & passenger agent at Prince Rupert, has announced a new passenger rate for west-bound traffic to Prince Rupert; this consisting of a cent a mile rate to Prince Rupert on the train leaving Prince George on December 4th. The rate is to apply from all stations Prince George and west. The return limit will be December 8th. and it is expected a large number will take advantage of this rate to visit Rupert.

"REMEMBRANCE DAY FESTIVAL"

Everything is in readiness for the big celebration in commemoration of the end of the Great War which took place in Flanders, fifteen years ago to-day. At this time there is among us a new generation that must be taught what their fellow countrymen went through during those days; and, unfortunately, there are with us older people who might forget if they were not reminded once each year. The Veterans and their Families extend the heartiest welcome to all to attend the service this morning and also be with them the rest of the day when the best entertainment will be provided for their enjoyment.
