Death and Funeral of Mrs. E. B. Smith

Early Sunday morning, December 1, 1940, Mrs. E. B. Smith passed quietly away at her home on Church avenue, after a lengthy illness.

The late Mrs. Maggie Bessie Smith was born in Scotland, Ontario in 1871, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Wheeland.

She was married to Mr. Smith in her home town on October 18, 1896.

The late Mrs. Smith came to Vanderhoof with her family in July, 1910,

and has since taken an active part in the affairs of the Presbyterian and United Churches, being president of the Ladies Aid Society for a number of years, prior to her first illness. Mrs. Smith was originally a member of the Congregational Church in Ontario.

The Deceased leaves to mourn three sons, Gordon E. Smith, of Evergreen Valley, Olympia, Washington; Harold W. Smith, of Fort St. James; and Lowell B. Smith on Active Service in England; and two daughters, Mrs. G. Ogston, of Vanderhoof; and Mrs. R. C. McCorkell, of Vancouver. There are also six grandchildren.

The funeral service was held in the United Church on Thursday afternoon commencing at two-thirty o'clock; conducted by the Rev. Hugh Herbison, resident minister. Mrs. J. Warren Johnson presided at the organ; and the Choir led the singing of those hymns: - "Still will we trust though earth seem dark and dreary" and "Lead Kindly Light". An appropriate address was delivered by the Minister. The casket was covered with many beautiful wreaths and floral tributes.

Interment took place at the Vanderhoof cemetery, where the last rites were administered. The pall bearers were Messrs. H. L. Black, J. R. Boyd, J. K. Frost, S. Holmes, E. C. McGeachy, and W. J. Rimes.

The deepest sympathy for the Bereaved is felt by the people of this community.

Passing of One of Our Real Old Timers

One of the real old timers of the Vanderhoof district, succumbed last Saturday, after a lengthy illness, covering several years. We regret to record the death of William Redmond; which took place at the home of his sister-in-law, Mrs. R. J. Redmond, in the Prairiedale district.

The Deceased old timer was born at Ballinadrummond, in County Wexford, Ireland, in 1853, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Redmond.

It is nearly sixty years ago since he left his native land and first came to Canada. For many years he was in the western States following mining; and was considered to be a very good miner; being employed on a number of large mining projects, and held in high esteem by company superintendents.

The late Mr. Redmond first came to this district about 1907, and settled close to the Nechako river, a few miles from Vanderhoof, where he has followed farming operations.

Since passing the four score years his health has failed, and the end came last Saturday.

The funeral service was held in Holy Trinity Church, Vanderhoof, the service being conducted by the Rev. J. M. McCormick, F.R.G.S., who delivered an excellent address on the sterling character of the Deceased and the lessons to be derived from his example.

Mr. Frank Bowman presided at the organ, and two well known hymns were sung by the congregation. "Lead, Kindly Light", by the Rev. J.

H. Newman; and Bishop E. H. Bickersteth's "Peace, Perfect Peace, in this dark world of sin".

Interment took place at the local cemetery, following the Church service. The pall bearers were Messrs. D. W. Donald, J. H. McMillan, C. Prout, and A. J. Rae.

The Deceased leaves a sister living in Ireland.

Christmas Leave for Soldiers

Mr. J. Gray Turgeon has written to the Secretary of the Vanderhoof and District Board of Trade in regard to Soldiers going home for the Christmas and New Year vacation, in the following manner.

"I am very sorry that it was impossible for me to be of any help in our efforts to meet your wishes and the wishes of many others in connection with the cost of transportation. You will notice that yesterday the Associate Minister of National Defence informed the House of Commons that the Department of National Defence had finally decided that they could give no further help with respect to cost of soldiers' travelling while on Christmas leave.

"With regard to the number of days leave, I indicated to Mr. Cameron and to Mr. Paul that Officers Commanding Districts, and those Commanding the Atlantic and Pacific Military Commands have authority to permit a soldier to join his Christmas leave with that of his ordinary leave under present regulations so that the six days leave for Christmas may be extended; provided the soldier wishes to use up his ordinary leave and provided further that his Officer Commanding thinks it wise to grant the request".

The marriage took place at two o'clock on Saturday afternoon, November 30, 1940, at Deer Park Memorial Church, Toronto, of Miss Mollie Moore daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Reid, and Mr. James Craig, of Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.
