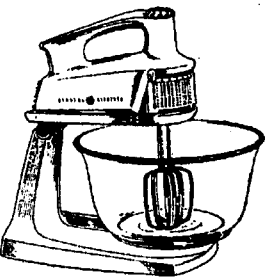

Many varieties of shells were artistically displayed by Mrs. Esther Campion.

There were several entries of embroidered scenes. One petite-point by Mrs. Frieda Lebler, of a bowl of poppies, has 79,200 stitches in it. Others to enter fine embroidered scenes were Mrs. T. E. Gerhardt, Parda Stuka, Mrs. E. M. Hall and Mrs. Mary Smedley.

A raw wool knitting display was entered by Mrs. F. Hodgkins. There were also hooked rugs in this display. Bevon Geerncart displayed a considerable number of entries in aluminum etching and woodwork.

A new feature this year that took the fancy of many visitors was a picture display of the early days around Vanderhoof, for the benefit partly of newcomers to the district. It included prints of old homesteads, oldtimers, old buildings, and ways of work when the country was first settled.

Beadwork was entered by Mrs. E. Louie.

Kapstick projects and ribbon craft and corsages were exhibited.

Extensive handwork entries were made by Mrs. W. Evans and Mrs. Lindstrom, mostly crocheting.

Petite-point jewelry made by Mrs. B. Grey were entered.

Two knit baby layettes were entered by Mrs. H. Tweed.

Model kit displays were entered by Bill Weeks and Arthur Wilde. Also displayed were novelty plastic and crocheted articles by Mrs. Rainbird. Clifford Irving entered mosaic tile exhibits and a coin collection.

Entries from the Handicapped School included free form painting, finger painting and easter baskets.

An antique display provoked considerable interest and questions.

Silver and china and tools of the late J. W. Shortreed were entered.

An ornate cup that was presented to the uncle of Mrs. Charles Carpenter by the Czar of Russia in appreciation of work done during the Russian-Japanese war, of 1912 showed exquisite workmanship and design.

A foot warmer and candle mold were entered by Mr. Garret.

Mrs. F. V. Andrus entered a small sad iron that is 100 years old, while Mrs. J. E. Gerhardt entered a large one from Russia, also 100 years old, that used coals for heat.

A noise maker burglar alarm was entered by Mrs. H. V. Taylor.

A photography display by Bill Morley included color prints of animals and flower closeups and portrait studies.

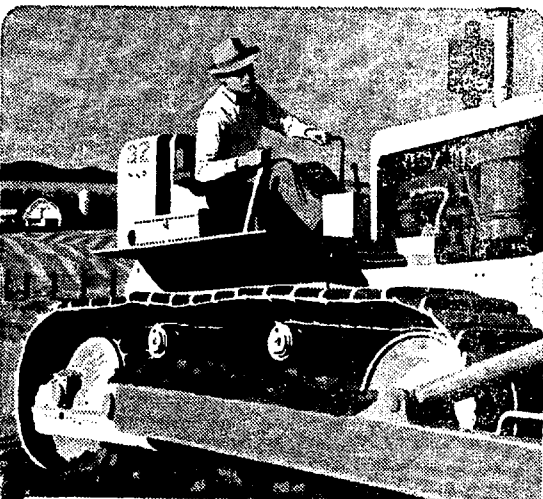
