## Death of Pte. T. A. Park

News has been received from the British military authorities in France that one of the old timers of the central interior has been called by Death in Kemmel hospital. Last week the relatives of Private Thomas Alexander Park were notified that he was dangerous ill, and he has since passed away. The late Private Park was among the best known men in the interior, coming up north from the Kootenay country about twelve years ago. For a number of years, before and during railroad construction times, the deceased was a freighter on the old Caribou road between Ashcroft, Quesnel, and the Nechako. He had a farm near Tachic lake which he worked until August two years ago when he volunteered for active service. Alex Park was considered an excellent man with horses, and proved himself very useful in the army in this service. He was an active member of the Lakes District Farmers' Institute, and took a lively interest in the various progressive movements of the community. He was always ready to help, and the lakes district farmers looked upon him as a good and useful neighbour.

The late Alex. Park was born in Seaford, Ontario, thirty-four years ago, and came to British Columbia with his parents, Thomas and Mrs. Park of Nelson, twenty five years ago. He brother, Ferguson, is a successful farmer in the Nulki lake district.

There seems to be no check to the spreading of the influenza epidemic in this district at present. Every day seems to add new names to the list of victims. Dr. W. Ross Stone is doing everything in his power to cope with the situation, which is far too much for one physician to handle. Since he returned from his professional trip to Fort McLeod he has not spared himself day or night. At present he has thirty-eight patients in Vanderhoof, twenty-three cases north of the river and Braeside, eleven at Fort Fraser, and one in Chilco, and calls from other sections and towns along the railway line. The most serious case is John Sudermann at Braeside. The doctor expresses little hope of his recovery.

## Turkey Unconditionally Surrenders

The war news received the past two days is most encouraging and shows definite signs of the beginning of the end, which the whole world is earnestly looking forward to. On Thursday an armistice was signed at Monis to the effect that Turkey has surrendered unconditionally. The Ottoman forces have ceased fighting, and one army division including a general have laid down their arms. This event, which has been looked forward to for weeks, will severely clip the wings of the Germans. What punishment will be meted out to the Turks is not yet publicly known, but it is safe to predict that Turkey's unscrupulous behaviour during the war, especially her diabolical wholesale massacre of the Armenians, will not be overlooked. The Turks have been conspicuous for their brutality and devilish cold bloodedness and will have to be dealt with in accordance with the only principle they fully comprehend—that of power and severity.

It is officially reported that Austria has applied for an armistice, though a few days ago the monarch declared he would not break his word of honour to the Kaiser not to make a separate peace. It would appear that recent events and the temper of his subjects is leaving him no alternative. The Berlin and Vienna railway has been cut by revolutionists. On the Italian front the Allied army have captured Vidal, cutting off a retreat of fifteen Austrian divisions. The whole Italian front is ablaze. The entire Allied army is engaged on a two hundred mile front.

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## VANDERHOOF NEWS

Harry and Mrs. Ingham are very sick with influenza.

R. K. and Mrs. Finlayson arrived back from their honeymoon trip to Alaska on Sunday morn.

Wm. Bunting, of the Hudson's Bay Company, Fort St. James, has returned from a business trip to Victoria.

The body of the late Harold Chatterton was shipped on Thursday to Biggar, Saskatchewan, for interment.

Conductor T. Williams died in Prince George last Saturday, and his remains were taken to Prince Rupert for burial.

Brakesman Dodds died Tuesday morning in Prince Rupert, and Engineer McCall on Monday. Both were influenza cases.

Constable Manson went to Pr. George on Thursday morning to assist in coping with the epidemic now spreading among the Indians in that district.

E. B. Smith has cleared an area of land at the back of his large garage and barn, allowing ample space for work and entrance at both Second and Third streets.

Mrs. Gus, wife of the section foreman at Rose Lake, was taken to Prince George hospital and died on Tuesday. She leaves a husband and five children to mourn.

After spending three weeks at Mandalay farm, Stuart river, J. G. Whiteacre returned on Wednesday night to his home in Vanderhoof. He was superintending the structure of new buildings, and other improvements.

Word has been received from Frank S. Reid, of Chilco, now in France, who is in a very cheerful mood over the recent successes, and feels that his return to the Nechako ere another year passes looks distinctly bright.

The worst marine tragedy in the history of the Pacific coast occurred last Saturday when the Canadian Pacific steamer "Princess Sophia", which two days previous crashed on Vanderbilt Reef, Lynn canal, hammered by a terrific gale, was driven across the jagged reef and lost with all aboard. The ship went down with 318 souls on board.

The people of this community are very grateful for the untiring efforts and services of Father Coccoia during the influenza epidemic, especially during the absence of the doctor while away up north, when he spared himself neither day nor night, attending the sick. Notwithstanding numerous cases of serious illness and several deaths among his own people he gave what medical attention he possibly could to others.

Ten cars of cattle passed here last Thursday on their way to the Bulkley valley.

Died—At Braeside, on Monday October 28, of pneumonia, after an illness of eleven days, Abraham Dyck, born at Winkler in Manitoba, 24 years ago. The deceased was the son of George and Mrs. Dyck.

Died—At his home near Vanderhoof, on Friday, October 25, of pneumonia, after an illness of nine days, Harold E. Chatterton, who was born in Wellington, Ontario, on June 26th, 1900, son of Edgar and Mrs. Chatterton.

Died—At Braeside, on Thursday, October 31, of pneumonia, after an illness of sixteen days, Peter G. Dyck, born at Winkler, Manitoba, on May 14, 1839, son of George and Mrs. Dyck. The funeral took place at Braeside on Friday, November first.

Died—At Vanderhoof, on the first of November, Sarah, the fifteen-year-old daughter of B. B. and Mrs. Neufeld. The deceased was taken sick with influenza which developed into pneumonia and succumbed after nine days illness. She was born in Herbert, Saskatchewan, on the 14th. of October, 1903.

## Mr. Moore Dead

The death of one of the most well known residents of the Chilco district occurred shortly after midnight last Saturday, in the person of Walter Stuart Moore. During the past three years the late Mr. Moore has played a conspicuous part in the public affairs of the Chilco district, and his place in local church, political, and school circles will not easily be filled. His death is deeply regretted by the whole community. The deceased was born in Bristol, England, in 1876. Eight years ago he came to Canada and was in the dry goods business in Vancouver until coming to the interior. He leaves a wife and two children to mourn.
